The Church and Civic Engagement Gathering Tuesday October 8 | 5-9 pm Bruce C. Bolling Municipal Building, Roxbury

Dear Christian Pastor or Leader,

"The entire law is summed up in a single command: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' If you keep on biting and devouring each other, watch out, or you will be destroyed by each other." (Galatians 5:14-15)

We believe this is a kairos moment for the Christian Church. The political strife of the past decade has caused damage and distrust, compromising our witness and eroding our sense of belonging to one another. Many of us feel fatigue and frustration with the "us versus them" rhetoric that pits us against one another, often creating false dichotomies. Jesus Christ calls us to unity, yet we often see the "acts of the flesh" (Galatians 5:20)—hatred, discord, rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, and factions—or weariness giving way to hopelessness and apathy taking root in our hearts and minds. Where is the proactive expression of "fruit of the Spirit" to one another in this time of national tension: love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control? And, for those of us who are exhausted by the political system, may we remember Apostle Paul's exhortation: "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up" (Galatians 6:9).

Now is the time for Christians to embody Christ's call to peacemaking and love of neighbor, rather than mimicking the divisions in society. UniteBoston, alongside a diverse group of Christian institutions—including BMA TenPoint, the Massachusetts Council of Churches, the Emmanuel Gospel Center, Boston Collaborative, Hellenic College Holy Cross, the Fellowship of Haitian Pastors of New England, the Focolare Movement, and other local churches—invite you to join a gathering of local Christian pastors and institutional leaders. **Together, we will share our experiences, hopes, and fears about leading through this election year and beyond, offering a proactive alternative to the "us versus them" mentality.** Grounded in our shared belovedness from God, Jesus's call to love our 'enemies' (Mt 5:44), and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we will engage in Reflective Structured Dialogue, a model developed by Cambridge's <u>Essential Partners</u>. This approach nurtures understanding and empathy across different perspectives and deep divides, avoiding the typical dynamics of polarized conversations.

Our hope for this gathering is to foster a different kind of conversation—one where we focus on *how we can engage with each other* over what we agree or disagree on, discussing our deeply-held values, formative experiences, and genuine hopes and fears. Though dialogues like this may be uncomfortable and challenging, they are essential for rebuilding trust and connection across our silos and for becoming the Beloved Community that Jesus calls us to be (John 17:20-24).

This gathering is for local Christian clergy, pastors and leaders in Greater Boston. Together, we hope to stand as a public witness to our churches and city, demonstrating that the Way of Jesus is to reconcile divides and seek the Imago Dei in all our neighbors across lines of difference. We will also share resources that can guide clergy in how to lead politically diverse communities with courage and peace.

Please save the date and plan to join us on **Tuesday October 8 from 5:00 to 9:00pm at the Bruce Bolling Municipal Building in Roxbury.
